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Introduction

Fiscal Year 2024 (FY 2024) began July 1, 2023 and ended June 30, 2024. During the fiscal year, 81% of our offenders successfully completed supervision.

The department operates its offender programs within a clear framework of public safety in supervising the 72,800 offenders under our legal jurisdiction. Legal jurisdiction includes offenders who were transferred out of state, absconded with active warrants, and others who are not under the active day-to-day supervision. At the end of the fiscal year, 22,779 offenders were under active supervision of the department. The description of active supervision represents only those offenders who had at least one active case on June 30, 2024. Our responses to offender risk and needs in the community are focused to address present or potential problems that may interfere with the successful completion of supervision without compromising public safety. We maintain a fundamental belief that given support, resources, and service interventions, the offender has the ability to make positive changes in his or her life.

The following tables provide a description of the offender population and answer some commonly asked questions regarding the department's programmatic efforts. Each table is preceded by a short description of its contents. The reader should be aware that there are different ways of reporting units of data depending upon the purpose. Admissions include only those offenders admitted to SCDPPPS who had no other active cases at the time of admission. Closures information reflects only the last order to close during the fiscal year.

Explanation of Program Types

Probation: Includes Probation, Conditional Discharged to Probation, Probation Terminated Upon Payment (PTUP), Split Probation (admitted to probation with a split sentence from prison), and Monitor for the Court.

Parole: Includes Parole.

Other: Includes YOA, Community Supervision Program, Supervised Furlough-2, Supervised Furlough-2A, Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ), and early release program cases.



Admissions by County



Admissions by Program Type



Majority (87%) of offenders admitted were sentence to probation in lieu of incarceration by the courts. Non-violent offenses (89%), offenders aged at least 25 years old (86%), and black males (40%) accounted for the majority of admissions.





Standard risk supervision accounted for 58% of the active population, 14% were medium risk, and 15% were high risk. In terms of specialized populations, 6% were domestic violence offenders, 4% sex offenders, and 1% mental health offenders




Closures by County

FY24 Offender Drug Testing Statistics Total Offenders Tested: 20,063

Total Offenders Tested Positive: 9,887 (49%)

SCDPPPS uses drug and alcohol testing to serve as a deterrent to drug and alcohol use by offenders. Testing is also used to detect current drug use. New admissions to supervision are tested on-site to detect marijuana, cocaine, opiates, amphetamines, methamphetamine, and benzodiazepines, and fentanyl. On-site initial testing will be conducted within 30 days of admission as part of the intake process.

Subsequent testing of offenders occurs if:

- The offender has a positive test result or has confessed to the use of illicit drugs and/or excessive alcohol use.
- The offender has demonstrated, through past criminal or personal records, that illicit drug use and/or excessive alcohol use is likely.
- The supervising agent/offender supervision specialist has a documented reason for suspecting illicit drug use and/or excessive or illicit alcohol use.
- Offenders who are released from a South Carolina Department of Corrections Addictions Treatment Unit or an inpatient treatment facility may be tested at a greater frequency for a period of six months.
- Offenders who are currently receiving alcohol and drug treatment on an outpatient basis will be tested randomly at the discretion of the agent/offender supervision specialist.

Total Positive Tests: 23,140

Of the 23,140 positive drug tests, majority (33%) tested positive for marijuana followed by methamphetamine (22%), amphetamine (20%), cocaine (10%), benzo (6%), fentanyl, (6%), and opiates (2%).



Sex Offender (SO) Statistics Offenders Under SO Supervision: 800 Registered Sex Offenders: 971

The department is responsible for supervising offenders sentenced to community supervision by the Court of General Sessions or released from incarceration on other supervision programs who have been convicted of sex offenses. SCDPPPS utilizes the Sex Offender Management Program to supervise sex offenders who are currently serving an active sentence for a sex offense (82%). A male sex offender's level of supervision is determined by his score on the Static-99 risk assessment. Female sex offenders are supervised at the SO-High level of supervision for the entirety of their supervision period. The three levels of male sex offender supervision are SO-High (78%), SO-Containment (21%), and SO-Intensive (1%).

For those offenders currently under supervision for an offense that is not a sex offense but who are required to register as a sex offender for a previous offense, SCDPPPS provides general **supervision** according to the offender's risk assessment score (18%).



Domestic Violence (DV) Offender Statistics Offenders Under DV Supervision: 1,429

The department supervises offenders sentenced to community supervision by the Court of General Sessions convicted of the offense of Domestic Violence as defined in S.C. Code Section 16-25-10 through 530.


SCDPPPS utilized the **Domestic Violence Management Program** to supervise domestic violence offenders who are currently serving an active sentence for a domestic violence offense. Domestic Violence offenders are supervised according to positive or negative behavior utilizing the supervision levels of DV-1, DV-2, and DV-3. All DV offenders begin on DV-1 supervision level for the first 90 days of supervision. With positive behavior and compliance with supervision standards, the offender is transferred to DV-2 for next 90 days. Further compliance and positive behavior lead to DV-3 supervision level, where the offender will remain throughout the duration of supervision if no violations or non-compliance occurs. The level of supervision determines how often the Agent has contact with the offender.



Mental Health (MH) Offender Statistics Offenders Under MH Supervision: 307

The department supervises individuals with a suspected or diagnosed mental illness as recognized by the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, 5th Edition Text Revision (DSM-V-TR), to promote rehabilitation and protection of the public.

Once an offender has been identified as someone living with a mental illness and having some level of instability related to their mental illness, they may be placed on the mental health caseload. Offenders will move through supervision levels based on the length of mental health stability. The department utilizes five mental health supervision levels: Mental Health Intensive, Mental Health 1, Mental Health 2, Mental Health 3, and Mental Health 4. Mental Health Intensive (MH-Int) offenders are ordered by the Court, hearing officer, supervisor, parole board, or releasing authority. Mental Health 1-4 supervision levels are based on meeting certain criteria over the course of supervision and following a screening process.

Mental Health Offender Contact Standards

The level of supervision determines how often the agent has contact with the offender.

Mental Health Intensive - 3 home visit progress audits or 2 home visit progress audits AND 1 home visit monthly. If homeless, 3 field visit progress audits.

- Treatment provider contact monthly.
- -Telephone progress audit biweekly.
- Attendance at Support Council.
- Obtain mental health records every three months.
- Office contact as neede<u>d.</u>
- Drug test every other month minimum.

Mental Health

- 2 home visit progress audits or 1 home visit progress audits AND 1 home visit monthly. If homeless, 2 field visit progress audits.
- Treatment provider contact monthly.
- -Telephone progress audit biweekly.
- Attendance at Support Council.
- Obtain mental health records every six months.
- Office contact as needed.
- Drug test every 3 months minimum.

Mental Health

- 1 home visit progress audit or field visit progress audit, with an home visit progress audit at least every other month.
- Treatment provider contact monthly.
- -Telephone progress audit monthly.
- Obtain mental health records every nine months.
- Office contact as needed.
- Drug test every 6 months minimum.

Mental Health 3

- 1 home visit progress
- audit bi-monthly - Treatment provider contact monthly.
- -Telephone progress audit mmonthly.



FY24 GPS Statistics Total Active GPS: 969

The department utilizes electronic surveillance to monitor certain offenders. On June 8, 2006, Jessie's Law, a bill aimed at protecting the state's children through tougher penalties for sexual predators was signed into law with an effective date of July 1, 2006. Named after Jessica Marie Lunsford -- who was murdered in 2005 by a registered sex offender in Florida -- the law imposes a mandatory minimum of 25 years in prison for sexual predators and mandates active Global Positioning Satellite (GPS) monitoring for sex offenders convicted of certain offenses. GPS can pinpoint within 15 meters a person's position on Earth using 24 satellites in orbit at 11,000 nautical miles above the Earth. The satellites are owned and operated by the U.S. Department of Defense and continuously transmit signals which can be detected by anyone possessing a GPS receiver. The use of Active-GPS enhances public safety and provides a more modern and efficient way to ensure accountability and enforce home detention and curfews for those offenders requiring a heightened supervision strategy. Of the 969 offenders on Active GPS on July 2, 2024, 646 (67%) offenders were on GPS under Jessie's Law.



Total Pending GPS: 381

Pending population with GPS monitoring pursuant to Jessie's Law includes offenders in a status of institutionalized, jail, inpatient treatment, absconded, etc. This population is **not** currently hooked up to a GPS unit, but will be once released into the community or located.

FY24 Administrative Hearings Total Administrative Hearings: 5,169

Statewide, 5,169 violation hearings were held during the fiscal year. At those hearings, 2,908 cases were continued or recommended for continuation, while 2,261 cases were revoked or

recommended for revocation.

Offenders pay restitution, supervision fees, and fines just prior to their Administrative Hearing to avoid further sanctions. During FY24, \$97,378.07 was collected in delinquent restitution payments, \$197,756.02 in supervision fees, and \$40,455.67 in court-ordered fines and fees. The total of \$335,589.76 collected demonstrates the effectiveness of the administrative hearing process in bringing offenders who have the means to become compliant with their monetary obligations.




Per statute SC 24-21-80, offenders are required to pay fees to help offset the cost of supervision. While supervision fees vary by level of supervision, most offenders are assessed \$50 per supervision month. Over 17 million dollars was collected in various fees and fines during FY24.

Statewide Collections



Majority of monies collected were related to supervision fees (53%), followed by restitution (30%), Administrative Monitoring (11%), other fees (6%), and fines (<1%).

Statewide Collections by Method of Payment



The most popular methods of payment are by credit card (51%) followed by cash (28%), and money order (3%). Eleven percent (11%) of all collections were through the Government Enterprise Accounts Receivable Program (GEAR).

Recidivism Rates

To calculate recidivism rates, offenders from an admission cohort are followed for three years from the start of their supervision. Thus, the most recent data we have available for analysis of recidivism is the FY21 admissions cohort. If the offender is admitted to SCDC within 3 years, the offender is considered to have recidivated.

Over the past 10 years, the percent of offenders admitted to SCDC after being admitted to SCDPPPS continues to decline.
